

<u>San Juan Resilience Youth Summit</u>


Ages: Middle and Highschool presenters- All ages can attend

Fort Collins Natural Areas

Age: K-12

They offers place-based learning through field trips and classroom visits. Activities align with curriculum standards, and detailed lesson plans are available on the website.

Larimer County Solid Waste Garage Education Center

They offer an interactive experience where visitors learn about waste, recycling, and landfill operations. With engaging displays for all ages, including a "Mountain of Trash" tunnel, the center explores waste reduction and sustainable alternatives.

<u>Larimer County Department of</u> Natural Resources

They offer life and earth science programs that are hands-on, interactive, support Colorado state science standards and inspire stewardship of our natural resources.





OUTDOOR & HANDS ON EDUCATION

Ages: All

Bird Conservancy of the Rockies

Connects people of all ages to nature through birdfocused education and experiences. The conservancy fosters appreciation for birds and their role in the environment.

Colorado Youth Outdoors

Provides hands-on outdoor activities such as fishing, survival skills, archery, and shooting sports on 220 acres, with equipment supplied. Programs emphasize social-emotional learning and can include optional lessons on ecology, conservation, and history.

Environmental Learning Center

The CSU Warner College offers a variety of programs including K-12 programs, summer camps and after school programs. Their programs are dedicated to inspire and educate people to connect with and become stewards of our natural world.

<u>Gardens on Spring Creek</u>

They provide engaging, hands-on science education programs, focusing on the landscapes and animals present. After tours, groups can enjoy the Children's Garden.







NOCO BEET is a collaborative of Environmental Education organizations working together to further the impact and quality of environmental education in northern Colorado.

Their mission is to cultivate a network of Northern Colorado educators who collaborate, support, and provide resources to increase student access to impactful and effective environmental education.

OUTDOOR & HANDS ON EDUCATION

Ages: K-12

<u>Cache La Poudre National Heritage</u> <u>Area</u>

Learning in Our Watershed (LIOW) engages students with the history and natural habitats of the Cache la Poudre River through experiential outdoor education. By collaborating with local museums and organizations.

CO State Forest Service

Education about trees and forestry through Project Learning Tree (PLT). This initiative provides educators with resources and training for environmental education and offers free outdoor activities for families to connect children with nature.

High Plains Environmental Center

Highlights native ecosystems within a 3,000-acre suburban area, providing a "living laboratory" for visitors. Explore demonstration gardens, trails, and educational programs. Learn about native plants and eco-friendly practices.


Poudre Learning Center

Offers field experiences and stewardship action programs to empower K-12 students. They help educate students through outdoor education

Rocky Mountain National Park

They offers free in-person and virtual interactive programming, allowing students to explore and learn about the park's resources.







OUTDOOR & HANDS ON EDUCATION

Ages: Specific Grades

Central CO Water Conservancy District

Ages: 4th and 5th

The goal of The Children's Water Festival is to allow students to dive deeper into water related issues that face the South Platte River Basin, where our food comes from and how to be better stewards of our natural resources.

City of Loveland Open Lands & Trails

Ages: pre K through 9th

They have conserved over 5,000 acres and manage numerous natural areas and trails, including the Big Thompson River Trail and others. They offer environmental education, volunteer opportunities and more!

YMCA of the Rockies - Estes Park Center

Ages: 1st through 8th

Provides residential environmental education, focusing on outdoor, standards-based learning on its 860-acre site near Rocky Mountain National Park.





Empowering Students for a Sustainable Future

Preparing high school students to take the lead in addressing the economic and social impacts of a changing climate.

The Seal of Climate Literacy is a certification given by a local education provider (LEP) to students who have studied principles of climate literacy and demonstrated their understanding of these principles through hands-on learning by or before their high school graduation.

The skills gained through this certification pave the way for empowering students to thrive in a rapidly evolving environment. By integrating local climate-related challenges into the curriculum, partnering with local experts, and providing hands-on training and community engagement opportunities, the Seal of Climate Literacy prepares students for a future grounded in resilience.

What It Takes To Earn The Seal

To earn the Seal of Climate Literacy, Colorado students must meet minimum graduation requirements and successfully complete:

· A high school science course

• A course incorporating climate literacy standards

An experiential learning project approved by their school

These requirements ensure that students gain a well-rounded understanding of climate change, its impacts, and potential solutions, while also actively engaging in hands-on experiences that foster a sense of agency and responsibility.


More Ways to Take Action Beyond This Guide...
